On July 18, Mary Ann Malack-Ragona, Executive Director/CEO, Alzheimer's Disease Resource Center, Inc., presented a check in the amount of \$5,000 to Susan Solomon, Chief Executive Officer, New York Stem Cell Foundation, at a special gathering in East Hampton. The grant will assist the NYSCF in its continuing research into finding a cure for Alzheimer's disease using manufactured stem cells.

The grant came from part of an anonymous donation that ADRC recently received. This was the second research study the organization has funded. On June 26, ADRC presented a check in the amount of \$3,000 to Dr. Irving H. Gomolin, Chief, Division of Geriatric Medicine, Winthrop-University Hospital in Mineola for his study on how the removal of Namenda from the

marketplace and the use of its substitute — an extended release formulation — will impact the blood levels of patients with Alzheimer’s disease or dementia.

The New York Stem Cell Foundation (NYSCF) is a non-profit organization whose mission is to accelerate cures for major diseases through stem cell research. NYSCF focuses on translational research in a model designed to overcome the barriers that slow discovery.
